Key Information

This half term we will be thinking about the different types of gifts we can give and why giving is important. We will also be finding out about the Christian celebration Christmas and the Islamic festival Eid al-Fitr. We will learn why Christmas can be important to many Christians and why Eid al-Fitr can be important to many Muslims. We will learn how they are both celebrated and will then go on to explore the importance of giving and gifts in both celebrations.

It is believed that the three wise men took 12 days to reach Jesus Christ's birthplace, and that is why we sing, "12 days of Christmas".

The story of the birth of Jesus is very important to many Christians. Many believe he was a gift from God. People celebrate Christmas in lots of different ways and these include acting out a nativity, carol singing, putting up and decorating Christmas trees and hanging wreaths. Many families get together for a special meal on Christmas Day. Many Christians give gifts at Christmas to show their love for one another. After his birth, the Three Wise Men gave Jesus special gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. They were the kinds of gifts given to kings in the ancient world. They were very valuable and were probably the first ever Christmas presents!!

Did you know...

Joseph travelled to Egypt with Jesus and he was safe.

- 36 million Christmas Trees are produced each year? Christmas trees take almost 7-10 years to mature.
- In the Ukraine, if you find a spider web in the house on Christmas morning, it is believed to be good luck!
- Many people abbreviate Christmas "Xmas," which is actually based upon X being the first letter of Jesus Christ's name in Greek.




Ramadan and Eid al-Fitr

Ramadan is a very special time for many Muslims. It celebrates the time when the Qur'an was revealed to the prophet Muhammad (PBUH). It is celebrated at a different time every year because Islam uses a lunar calendar, which is based on the cycles of the moon. During Ramadan, many Muslims fast during daylight hours. Often, they go to the mosque to read the Qur'an. People who are young, elderly or ill don't have to fast. Muslims will often have a meal called suhoor before sunrise and another called iftar after sunset. Many Muslims fast during Ramadan because it reminds them of people in the world who have less than they do. Zakat is often given at this time. Many Muslims give food or money to help those in need.

Eid al-Fitr is the time when many Muslims celebrate the end of Ramadan. It lasts for three days and is a very special time. During

Eid al-Fitr, Muslims may give

thanks to Allah for giving them the strength to fast during Ramadan. It is also a time for many Muslims to think about others. Eid al-Fitr is celebrated in lots of different ways. Many families go to the mosque to pray. Gifts are often given and are usually opened after the morning prayer and people can exchange cards that say 'Eid Mubarak!'
